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BJP ALLOTTED 14 MINISTRIES, JD(U) 8 IN 26-MEMBER CABINET

Nitish sworn in as Bihar CM for record 10th time

BIHAR'S LONGEST-SERVING

CHIEF Minister Nitish Kumar was sworn in on Thursday as Bihar's 10th time chief minister in a record ceremony, attended by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, CMs of several NDA-ruled states, and senior alliance leaders.

Kumar was administered the oath of office by Governor Arif Mohammed Khan at the Gandhi Maidan, where a massive nakshatrasag was conducted for the ceremony, also attended by Union Home Minister Amit Shah and BJP National President Jagat Prakash Nadda, both of whom had arrived in Patna on Wednesday night.

Along with 74-year-old Kumar, 26 ministers took the oath of office: 14 from the Bharatiya Janata Party, eight from Janata Dal (United), two from Lok Jan Shakti Party (Ram Vilas), and one each from Hindustani Awam Morcha (HAM) and Rashtriya Lok Morcha (RLM).

The ministers included Samrat Choudhary and Vijay Kumar Sinha, both deputy CMs in the previous government, who have been elected as the BJP's leader and deputy leader, respectively, following the polls that were swept by the NDA, which got 202 seats in the 243-member assembly.

Out of 26, five ministers in the new Nitish cabinet are Dalits — one each from BJP, UPRV, and HAM, and two from JD(U). Eight ministers belong to the upper castes, including four Kshatriyas. Three Yadavs have also been accommodated in the new cabinet, which is a mix of senior coalition leaders and new entrants, with the focus on caste and regional balance. The portfolios to the ministers were not immediately allocated.

a proven track record of good government for many years. My best wishes to him for his tenure ahead," Modi wrote on X.

Modi, who had told voters during the campaign that he would "return for the swearing-in of an NDA government", delighted the crowd when he lifted his tadeenak "ganucha" and swirled it above his head, a gesture that has become a signature of the 75-year-old leader.

The Prime Minister also posted on X: "Congratulations to Samrat Choudhary and Vijay Kumar Sinha on becoming deputy chief ministers of Bihar. Both leaders have worked extensively at the grassroots in serving people. Best wishes to them." Leaders of several NDA-ruled states, including TDP chief and Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu, and BJP's Rajya Sabha MP Adityanath (Utter Pradesh), Himanta Biswa Sarma (Assam), Devendra Fadnis (Maharashtra), Mohan Yadav (Madhya Pradesh), and Rekha Gupta

(Delhi) attended the ceremony. With a tally of 89 out of 243 seats, the BJP, which emerged as the single largest party, had the lion's share of 14 ministers in the new cabinet.

Besides Choudhary and Sinha, other BJP leaders who took the oath included Manoj Pandey, Nitin Nabin, and Surendra Prasad Mehta, all of whom were ministers in the previous government.

From the JD(U) quota, all the inductees were ministers in the previous government, including Zama Khan, the lone Muslim MLA in the NDA bloc

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ED files chargesheet against Vadra in UK-linked PMLA case

On Thursday filed a chargesheet against businessman Robert Vadra, husband of Congress MP Priyanka Gandhi Vadra, in a money laundering case linked to fugitive UK-based arms consultant Sanjay Bhandari, officials said.

The supplementary prosecution complaint has been filed before a special Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) court here, they said.

The case has been listed for co-accused proceedings on December 6, the officials said. This is the second money

laundering chargesheet against Vadra. In July, he was charged by the ED in a money laundering case linked to alleged irregularities in a land deal in Haryana's Shiikohpur.

Vadra has been questioned by the ED in the Bhandari-linked case in the past. There was no immediate response from Vadra or his legal team.

Unlearn single window, learn ecosystem approach: 'Ease of doing Business' sutra

The context of a transformative design influences the change. Incremental improvement or rearranging with the existing system—calling it "reform"—doesn't yield the desired result. This is the reason many reform initiatives have not yielded outcomes on the ground, despite the intent at the top.

The current effort of the newly formed High-Level Committee on Regulatory Reforms can hopefully establish a broader context to thoughtfully redesign systems and create an institutional mechanism that prevents regulatory chicanery from building up.

There is a further context to this unclogging. The main objective is to unleash entrepreneurial imagination and energy of the nation. Whether Infosys or HDFC Bank or Nykaa's democratisation of the right of women to wear what they want, it is a matter of whether the regulatory that enabled them came first—the unseen and unforeseen responses emerge from regulatory change.

There is an emerging, emergency, for India to export and wake up the legacies of its glorious mercantile past. As Swami Vivekananda said—"Arise and awake and sleep not, for the time has come when we need all of them to face the forces pressing our rise, rather than wanting to colonise us. Therefore, a more decisive approach to reform is needed."

Monetary and regulatory reform. The resolve of the regulators must ensure that the world's number 3 economy also becomes at least number 15 in terms of Ease of Doing

Business (EODB).

There are four systemic sources of this regulatory chicanery. First, departmental silos—physical or digital. Second, high administrative discretion instead of rules-driven decisions. Third, redundant data filing, regulatory unpredictability and the resulting information asymmetry. And yes, there is a fifth: the entrenched propensity for corruption. The government has acknowledged three levers for removing regulatory chicanery. First, "decriminalisation" under Jan Vishwas. Second, "deregulate." And most importantly, "digitalisation."

This write-up focuses on the third lever as a transformative action. Departments remain inward-looking clinging to traditional processes. This translates into monolithic departmental portals, or at best, a "Single Window" at the government level. 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26 e-comm firms are free from dark patterns: Govt

AS MANY AS 26 top e-commerce companies, including Zepho, BigBasket and Zomato, have given an undertaking that their platforms are free from misleading claims and unfair trade practices which could cause harm to consumers, the government said on Thursday.

The Centre, which is keeping a close watch on e-commerce platforms for any potential violation of dark patterns, said it would take action against such practices to protect consumer interests.

The government addressed two e-commerce platforms to remove the PAN 20 as a unique entity ID and "Entity Locker" as a document-issuance tool. There is more needed, for example building the next-generation India Code 2.0 — a searchable, interoperable, and subscription-enabled. This has to be legitimised by a Transparency of Regulation Act (TORA), giving citizens and businesses the right to know the applicable law with ease. The building blocks themselves won't convert to NRCG-connected system. An NRCG layer and an integrative body are a must. The bottleneck is reimagining the possibility of NRCG and the power of the triple helix of policy (OpenAPI and OpenData), creating connected systems and structures that are interoperable and subscription-enabled.
